

The World Bank has reaffirmed its commitment to deepening its partnership with the Rwandan government through a range of development projects aimed at fostering economic growth and social progress.

This was highlighted during a meeting on Wednesday between Prime Minister Dr. Edouard Ngirente and Qimiao Fan, the World Bank's Director for Rwanda, Somalia, Kenya, and Uganda.
